




The pain of division was palpable. But amidst his overwhelming grief over the plight of his nation, the prophet Ezekiel received a vision of a future where God's people were united once more.

The promise of God is that of "one nation in the land, on the mountain of Israel".

The Churches in Korea have found that this passage in Ezekiel resonates with their own sense of sadness over the division of their own country since the Korean War and have brought some of the insights they have gained to the worship for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

We too may feel the pain of a divided church.

The "Charta Oecumenica" (Guidelines for the Growing Co-operation among the Churches in Europe) states "Fundamental differences in faith are still barriers to visible unity. There are different views of the church and its oneness, of the sacraments and ministries. We must not be satisfied with this situation. Jesus Christ revealed to us on the cross his love and the mystery of reconciliation; as his followers, we intend to do our utmost to overcome the problems and obstacles that still divide the churches."

A crucial part of this task is for us - people of different churches and traditions - to come together to pray for this unity, in faithfulness to our Lord Jesus Christ who prayed that his disciples might be one.

I therefore commend to you the worship for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2009 and trust that they may help to resource your praying and working together for the full visible unity of the Church.

**Mass with Archbishop Patrick on his return to Liverpool from the Holy Land**

On Friday last Archbishop Patrick presided at mass with about 30 priests and 200 faithful in the Cathedral, the first thing he did on his return to Liverpool from the Holy Land after being in Bethlehem with Bishops from North America and Europe for the previous 5 days. This was the final statement of the Bishops.

**Stop the violence! Stop the killing! Start to build peace!**

Over and over again we heard these cries during the 9th visit of the Co-ordination of Episcopal Conferences to the Mother Church of Jerusalem in this divided and suffering land. The violence in Gaza was on everyone's minds and lips. We heard directly about the human tragedy from the parish priest of Gaza, Father Manawel Musallam.

There can be no peace unless people believe in peace. There can be no security unless there is security for all. There can be no justice unless there is justice for everyone in this land. Faith gives us hope that justice, peace and forgiveness are possible—a conviction shared by our hosts, His Beatitude Fouad Twal and the Assembly of Catholic Ordinaries of the Holy Land.

We are pastors, not political leaders, but the religious voice is vital to the search for peace. The reality that every human person is created in the image of God demands dignity for all. The message of the Prince of Peace, born in this land, reminds us that peace is possible. "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light." (Isaiah 9:2) The darkness of this time will give way to light.

To the leaders of the international community we say: Work with Israelis and Palestinians to stop the violence in Gaza and provide urgently needed humanitarian assistance. But do not stop there. With one voice press



Israelis and Palestinians to build a just peace with security for Israel and a viable state for Palestinians.

To the people of God in our countries we say: Intensify your prayer for the welfare of the Mother Church and the peace of Jerusalem. Do not be afraid. Come as pilgrims to the Holy Land and meet the living Christian communities here. Join us in persuading our governments to make Israeli-Palestinian peace a high priority. Support concrete projects and partnerships with the local Christian communities that are struggling for survival.

To the Christians of the Mother Church in the Holy Land we say: We see in you the suffering face of Christ who lost everything for our sake. You are not alone. We are one family, a worldwide communion in Christ. We hear your cries as you suffer alongside your brothers and sisters in the wider community.

We assure you of our love, our prayer and our continued solidarity. We ask you to pray for us.

**Father Manawel Musallam** pastor of Holy Family Parish in Gaza City, and the only Catholic priest in Gaza wrote: "What you see on television cannot be compared to what is happening. The word love is choking in my throat. ... We are living like animals in Gaza. We cry and nobody hears us. I am asking God for mercy and pray that the light of Christianity continues to shine in Gaza."

**Archbishop Patrick last Friday night said:** that surprisingly he has had an experience of Resurrection during his time in the Holy Land this year for three reasons:

1. A Catholic Wedding took place at the first official mass of the 10 Bishops – much to the surprise, amazement and joy of all, a sign that light will overcome the darkness.
2. Father Manawel Musallam said that after these tragic days are over Muslims and Christians in Gaza will continue to work together and help each other as they still do, a sign of hope in the dark times.
3. The seminary in the West Bank is so full of students that some have to be turned away. They have to study for 9 years to become priests, because they must first learn French – no theology books exist in Arabic. If they are prepared to study for 9 years the seminarians must hope in a future for which they offer their lives and so can we!
